**Outdoor Recreation** - Would you like to hike more than 25 miles of scenic beauty, or bike along the Appalachian Trail? If so, Greene County, TN, has just what you are looking for. Come and see why we boast of our beauty and wealth of outdoor recreation. Greene County also has seven beautifully landscaped golf courses for one to choose from as well as campgrounds, waterfalls and horseback riding trails.

**Historic Attractions** — Greene County enjoys a rich, historical heritage. Early settlers followed the Indians and animals to the Big Spring—a water source that eventually served the growing town of Greeneville for 150 years. Shown here is the “Showplace of East TN.” The Dickson-Williams Mansion is one of the prime examples of Federal architecture in Tennessee. During the Civil War, both Confederate and Union troops were entertained here. Admission is \$10 and daily tours begin at 1 p.m. in the lobby of the General Morgan Inn. Also visit the Doak House Museum, the President Andrew Johnson Museum and Library and the Old College on the campus of Tusculum College.



**Civil War** — Greene County is home to six Civil War Trail markers along the Civil War Trail in Tennessee. Follow the trail to see where the Pottertown Bridge Burners were convicted and hanged, view the lawn where General John Hunt Morgan, better known as the “Thunderbolt of the Confederacy,” was shot after spending his last night in the Dickson-Williams Mansion or visit the President Andrew Johnson Museum and Library on the campus of Tusculum College and see where students, in 1861 burned President Andrew Johnson in effigy and raised a Confederate flag. **Performing Arts & Culture** — Come and see the state-of-the-art Niswonger Performing Arts Center where entertainers such as Gladys Knight, Amy Grant, The Beach Boys and the Oak Ridge Boys have performed. This facility, located adjacent to Greeneville High School, offers a variety of performances, ranging from Broadway musicals to major concerts, national touring theatre and comedy along with regional and local performances. **What's New** — The City Garage Car Museum was founded in 2008 by Kent Bewley, a Greeneville native whose family has been in the automobile business since 1937. The museum has a very diverse collection of cars from a 1914 Ford Brass T Model to a 1971 DeTomaso Pantera Sports Car. The Emporium, the Palace Movie Theatre and Suzie Q's Diner add much to the museum. The Texaco Service Station display is so unique with the A-Model and T-Model service trucks along with the mule drawn Studebaker oil tanker. The museum hours of operation are Friday and Saturday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Admission is \$5 per person ages 5 and older. The museum is located on 210 S. Main.
